

The Sydney Morning Herald now available!

The first 50 years of the Sydney Morning Herald are now publicly available. (The Sydney Herald 1831-1842 and The Sydney Morning Herald 1842-1881). Issues from 1882- 1954 will be added weekly over the next few months.

The Melbourne Argus 1846-1945 complete

The Argus (and its previous title the Melbourne Argus) from 1846 - 1945 are now completed and available. The remaining 10 years (1945-1954) of the Argus will be made available in 2010 (mid to end of year).

Crowdsourcing - public correct 7 million lines of text!

About the program

The National Library of Australia, in collaboration the Australian State and Territory libraries, began a program in March 2007 to digitise out of copyright newspapers.

In July 2008 the Australian Newspapers was released to the public. This is a free online service that enables full-text searching of newspaper articles. The service includes newspapers published in each state and territory from the 1800s to the mid-1950s, when copyright applies. The first Australian newspaper, published in Sydney in 1803, is included in the service. By 2010 the service will comprise 40 million searchable articles.

Objectives

- Increase access to Australian newspapers
- Build a national service that will provide free online access from the first Australian newspaper published in 1803 through to the end of 1954
- Key Features of the service
 - Online access
 - Freely available
 - Full text searchable
- Allow user interaction Web2.0
 - Unmoderated OCR Text Correction
 - Tagging
 - Commenting





Release

- Very early release, 6 weeks in to development
- Appealed for volunteer 'testers'
- Beta mode for 1 year, half million testers, thousands of suggestions
- Development method later used for VuFind Catalogue and Trove - will now become the typical release methodology
- Internally developed, project managed by Rose Holley

- Initial focus on major titles from each state and territory
- 'Regional' titles being contributed by libraries 2009 onwards










Search & Delivery (Trove)

However, if you do login:

- . any tags or notes you add to books, articles, photographs etc become associated with your username
- · you can view just your tags and notes
- . you can choose to make some tags and notes "private", that is, visible only to yourself
- · you don't need to respond to a captcha challenge when adding tags or notes.
- you'll be credited with any corrections to the electronically generated newspaper article text you
 choose to make, and one day your efforts may be recognised by your name appearing on the
 Australian newspapers "text correctors hall of fame"!
- you can merge editions of books together and separate incorrectly merged editions or versions of books
- soon, you'll be able to create lists of results you've found and publish them for other users to browse






Washington, the cupital city of the United States of Americs, is the prototype and, in a sense, the inspiration of labberra. It is a city embodying many dens which are planned for Cauberra, and a review of the history of its construction and of the ideals represented there reveals a striking similarity to our own city.

Washington is undoubtedly one of the ideal cities of the world. A long susta ned and conscious effort to banish ugliners and to exalt beauty is apparent. on every hand. It is a city built to a fixed plan from the very beginning. The eyesores of industrialism and the irregularities of haphanard development have been alike avoided. Imposing buildings face her open spaces. Artis-Cally executed statues crown her squares. Her streets are hontered with shade trees, and down her broad avenues a hundred soldiers are said to have marched abreast. Factories and large scale industrialism have been rigidly excluded. 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

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



Time	User	Activity Corrects text in the article but doesn't know how to insert the pound symbol	
12:23	user 1		
12:24	user 1	Creates a comment on the same article saying that he doesn't know how to enter the pound symbol.	
19:13	user 2	Enters the pound symbol in the article.	
23:09	user 3	Spots an error in the correction by user 1, and fixes it.	

- Users seem to observe accidental mis-corrections of others within a short space of time and correct them.
- There have been two reported site spamming
- Correctors help each other

Maintaing Motivation

- Detailed instructions If you want a specific result, give us specific instructions. We will work better when we know exactly what's expected.
- Team Spirit Create an online environment of camaraderie. We'll work more effectively when we feel like part of team or virtual community. We don't want to let others down.
- Recognise achievement Make a point to recognize achievements one-on-one and also in group settings. We like to think we are being noticed and are making a difference. Show us how we fit into the big picture.
