

## **HOUSTON: Speaker Biographies**

### **Geraldine Aramanda**

In addition to serving as the Intellectual Property Manager of The Menil Collection, Geraldine Aramanda is currently the Archivist at the Menil Foundation. She has a B.L.A. in Art History and Philosophy from the University of St. Thomas, Houston, and has been associated with the Menil Foundation for 33 years in the areas of the library, special projects and curatorial research, intellectual property management, publications, and archives.

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### **Rhoda Goldberg**

Rhoda Goldberg is Assistant Library Director of the Harris County Public Library and chair of the Texas Library Association's Legislative Committee. She is also a member of the TexShare Advisory Board of the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. She received a Bachelor's Degree in International Affairs from George Washington University and an MLS from UT Austin.

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### **Georgia K. Harper**

Georgia K. Harper is the manager of the Intellectual Property Section of the Office of General Counsel for the University of Texas System, where she specializes in copyright law. Her online publication, The Copyright Crash Course, provides guidance to University faculty, students and staff concerning a wide range of copyright issues and is freely accessible to all universities and colleges.

Ms. Harper graduated with High Honors from the University of Texas at Austin with a B.S. in Education and with Honors from the University of Texas at Austin's Law School with a J.D. degree.

She conducts local, state, regional and national workshops and seminars on copyright issues and has been an advisor to the Association of American Universities, the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges and the American Council on Education, as well as the National Initiative for a Networked Cultural Heritage in connection with its Copyright and Fair Use Town Meetings.

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### **Lee Andrew Hilyer**

Lee Andrew Hilyer is Interlibrary Loan Librarian at Rice University. He obtained his BA in Spanish/French from the College of Charleston, and his Master's in Library

Science from the University of South Carolina. He has dealt with copyright in both the academic library environment and the corporate, for-profit library environment.

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### **Maryhelen Jones**

Maryhelen Jones is the Director of Library Services for Distance Education for the University of Houston System Libraries, including those located at UH's Central Campus, UH-Downtown, UH-Clear Lake, and UH-Victoria. In this role, she is responsible for initiating, planning, and coordinating delivery of library services in support of remote sits, extension courses, interactive television courses, and online instruction offered through each campus. In her 20 year career in librarianship, Maryhelen has been the Library Director at the College of Santa Fe and the Director of Central Michigan University's Off-Campus Library Services Program. She has published and spoken extensively on the topic of providing library services to distance learners in both traditional classroom settings and serving learners in asynchronous learning environments. Ms. Jones is active in the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) Distance Learning Section and the Past-chair of the University Continuing Education's Association's Futures and Change Community of Practice. She also serves as a UCEA Commissioner in the association's Learning and Information Technology Commission..

He and his staff also work with academic colleges on-campus to deploy technology in the classroom using multimedia and electronic presentation. Schott is active in numerous academic and distance learning organizations at the state, regional and national level and regularly speaks on the subject of distance learning. In addition to his administrative duties, he also teaches regularly in the history department. His most recent courses were offered via instructional television and the web. He received a BA in history and political science from Baylor University and an MA and Ph.D. in history from Louisiana State University.
