Sharing Results and Work Products

 IMLS expects you to ensure that final peer-reviewed manuscripts resulting from research conducted under an award are made available in a manner that permits the public to access, read, download, and analyze the work without charge.

...IMLS requires that at the end of your project, you provide IMLS at least one copy of any printed or physical distributable products and one copy of any electronic projects produced with IMLS funds. Printed or physical products include items such as learning resources, promotional materials, publications like journal articles or book manuscripts, research instruments, and reports from consultants or external evaluators. Electronic products include materials such as research datasets or software tools produced during the project....

Data: Current Terms and Conditions

Data Collection and Data Sharing

- ...IMLS expects you to deposit data resulting from IMLS-funded research in a broadly accessible repository that allows the public to use the data without charge no later than the date upon which you submit your final report to IMLS. You should deposit the data in a machine-readable, non-proprietary digital format to maximize search, retrieval, and analysis.
- Your project budget may include the costs of preparing the data for public release and for making the data publicly available, as long as these activities are charged before closeout (see 2 C.F.R. § 200.461 for additional details). In your final report to IMLS, you will be required to identify where your data has been deposited and can be accessed by the public.

The California Digital Library and the **Association of Research Libraries** will partner to enhance digital research data management infrastructures and services. The project addresses the urgent needs of academic and research libraries of varying sizes and budgets to respond to increasing requirements to share federally funded research data. By linking technical development with stakeholder engagement and coordination, the project team will focus on enhancing the DMPTool and persistent identifier registries to meet evolving funding agency requirements for machine-actionable data management plans (maDMPs). maDMPs will allow for a simplified approach to track information about research project outputs from inception through publication and the sharing of results. The project will support strategic planning for libraries as they implement these policies, workflows, and technical solutions to build local capacity for effective data management, publication, and reuse.

The Association of Research Libraries, along with Washington University in St. Louis, the University of Minnesota, Duke University, the University at Buffalo, and advisory board members from across the Data Curation Network, will conduct critical research on the economics of investments in public access to research data. To optimize public access to research data, funding agencies, institutions, and organizations must better understand the local landscape and required investments. The research team will conduct surveys and interviews with campusbased administrators and researchers to enable the development of expense and service models for public access to research data. Project deliverables will empower libraries wishing to expand resources for research data management and sharing support while simultaneously informing U.S. federal policy on data sharing.
